> Hermeticism particularly suited for infiltration.

- Christians co-opted Hermetic writings to promote Christianity, allowing infiltration.
- Islam, however, was ideally suited to carry Hermeticism
- The Fall of Constantinople provided opportunity for Hermeticism to penetrate Western Europe.

Islamo-Hermeticism

- Ibn al-Arabi wrote Fusus al-hikam (The Bezels of Wisdom).
- Ibn al-Arabi believed nature was a set of diffuse emanations from God like an unpolished mirror.
- Ibn al-Arabi believed that the consciousness of man was a microcosm of the god-universe that could focus these like polishing a mirror.
- Ibn al-Arabi believed people differ in their ability to polish that mirror, with only a few succeeding

Islamo-Hermeticism

- Ibn al-Arabi wrote Fusus al-hikam (The Bezels of Wisdom).
- Ibn al-Arabi believed Muhammad was the perfect man, whose intellect was identical to the first intellect.
- Ibn al-Arabi envisioned Islam as the endgame of spiritual evolution

Islamo-Hermeticism would become the philosophy of Jihadists via Muhammad Qutb, the brother of Muslim Brotherhood founder Sayyid Qutb.

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
